Directions to the Symposium

UMBC is conveniently located in the Baltimore-Washington corridor, just minutes from I-95 and the BWI airport and rail station.

Take I-95 (south from Baltimore or north from D.C.); take Exit 47B, Route 166 (I-195) west toward Catonsville; exit right onto campus (follow signs); at 2nd stop sign, turn right on Hilltop Circle; turn left on Commons Drive; park in the Commons Garage on your left; follow signs to the Public Policy Building.

OR, from I-695, take Exit 12C (Wilkins Avenue west); turn left on Walker Avenue; at stop sign, turn right on Hilltop Circle; follow remaining directions above.



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
