

# Responding to Community Health Needs within the Framework of the Affordable Care Act

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#### SPEAKERS' BIOS

Eileen L. Barsi is Director of Community Benefit at Catholic Healthcare West (CHW) in San

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Francisco, California. Ms. Barsi is responsible for planning, developing, coordinating, and overseeing system community benefit initiatives, as well as for educating system Management and System/hospital Board members about community benefit initiatives.

In collaboration with the System finance department, Ms. Barsi provides direction and oversight of the expense reporting for Community Benefit, in compliance with federal and state requirements. In this role, Ms. Barsi is a

member of the Mission Integration Department and is accountable to the Audit and Compliance and Strategy and Planning Committees of the CHW Board of Directors.

Ms. Barsi completed her undergraduate studies in education and graduate studies in gerontology at Notre Dame de Namur University in Belmont, California, and completed coursework in epidemiology at San Francisco State University. Currently, and for the last three years, she has also served as the Chairperson of the Community Benefit Committee of the Catholic Health Association. In 2000 and 2008, Ms. Barsi was the recipient of CHW's highest corporate employee recognition, the Values in Action Award for Excellence.

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# Georges C. Benjamin, MD, FACP, FNAPA, FACEP (E), Hon. FRSPH, is well known in the

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world of public health as a leader, practitioner, and administrator. Dr. Benjamin has been the Executive Director of the American Public Health Association (APHA), the nation's oldest and largest organization of public health professionals, since December 2002. He came to that post from his position as Secretary of the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. Dr. Benjamin became Secretary of Health in Maryland in April 1999, following four years as its Deputy Secretary for Public Health Services. As Secretary, Dr. Benjamin oversaw the

expansion and improvement in the state's Medicaid program.

Dr. Benjamin, of Gaithersburg, Maryland, is a graduate of the Illinois Institute of Technology and the University of Illinois College of Medicine. He is board-certified in internal medicine and a Fellow of the American College of Physicians; a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration; Fellow Emeritus of the American College of Emergency Physicians; and an Honorary Fellow of the Royal Society of Public Health.

An established administrator, author, and orator, Dr. Benjamin started his medical career in 1981 in Tacoma, Washington, where he managed a 72,000-patient visit ambulatory care service as Chief of the Acute Illness Clinic at the Madigan Army Medical Center. A few years later, he moved to Washington, D.C., where he served as Chief of Emergency Medicine at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center. After leaving the Army, he chaired the Department of Community Health and Ambulatory Care at the District of Columbia General Hospital. He was promoted to Acting Commissioner for Public Health for the District of Columbia and later directed one of the busiest ambulance services in the nation as Interim Director of the Emergency Ambulatory Bureau of the District of Columbia Fire Department.

Benjamin also serves on the boards of Research! America, Partnership for Prevention, the Reagan-Udall Foundation, and is a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies. In 2008, he was named one of the top 25 minority executives in health care by Modern Healthcare Magazine, in addition to being voted amongst the 100 most powerful people in health care in 2007 through 2010 and one of the nation's Most Influential Physician Executives in 2009, 2010, and 2011.



## **Cynthia Boddie-Willis, MD, MPH,** is The Hilltop Institute's Director of Health Services Policy

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and Research. Under her direction, Hilltop assists state health agencies, local health departments, and health service delivery organizations in implementing, monitoring, and evaluating the quality, affordability, and sustainability of publicly funded health care services; analyzing the administrative efficiency of health programs and systems; and informing health policy development.

Previously, Dr. Boddie-Willis directed the Division of Health Promotion and Disease Prevention at the Massachusetts Department of Public Health for ten years. She has more than 20 years of experience as a primary care provider and has worked in health care administration as a

consultant and an office managing partner.

Dr. Boddie-Willis has been principal investigator on several health-related research projects funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and has co-authored articles published in *Preventing Chronic Disease* and the *American Journal of Public Health*. Health disparities is a principle research interest.

Dr. Boddie-Willis earned her MD from the University of Chicago, her MPH from Harvard School of Public Health, and her BA in economics from the University of Chicago.

Abbey Cofsky, MPH, is a program officer with the Public Health Team at the Robert Wood

She works directly with the Foundation's public health grantees to promote the evidence about what works in public health, to advance national accreditation for public health departments and to advocate for laws and policies that improve health.

Ms. Cofsky, who joined the Foundation in 2007, was drawn to the Foundation's commitment to social change and the breadth of its work across the nation. She describes her

work as "striving to make communities healthier places to live." She also relishes the opportunity to interact with and learn from RWJF grantees.

Previously, Ms. Cofsky was the coordinator of community outreach and provider education for the Philadelphia Department of Public Health's Immunization Program. She also served as a research assistant for the Children's Safety Network at the Education Development Center in Washington, D.C., and as a na account executive with Dorland Global Health Communications in Philadelphia, Pa.



Ms. Cofsky holds an MPH from the George Washington University School of Public Health and Health Services and a BA from Boston College. She spent her undergraduate winter breaks teaching in Belize and conducted independent research on land use and women's rights in northeastern Brazil.

**Kathleen Hoke Dachille, JD,** is an Associate Professor of Law and Director of the Public Health

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Law Network, Eastern Region and the Center for Tobacco Regulation at the University of Maryland School of Law. Dachille teaches the Public Health Law Clinic through which she engages law students in the work of the Network and the Center.

The Public Health Law Network was launched in September 2010 with the goal of providing technical legal assistance to national, state and local public health professionals, their attorneys, legislators, and advocates working to develop sound public policy to improve public

health. The Network also develops factsheets, issue briefs, webinars, and other useful tools on emerging and persistent public health issues. Under Dachille's direction, the Network's Eastern Region deliverables have focused on environmental health, food safety, and injury prevention. Dachille has conducted research and prepared materials specifically related to hydrofracturing, medical marijuana laws, and health agency access to school health records.

Through the Center for Tobacco Regulation, Dachille provides technical legal assistance to Maryland state and local health officials, legislators, and organizations working in tobacco control. Recent work has focused on the regulation of cigars and the development of sound policies to create smoke-free multiunit housing.

Dachille joined the faculty in 2002 after serving for eight years with the Office of the Attorney General of Maryland. During her tenure as an Assistant Attorney General, Dachille served in the Civil Litigation Division and the Opinions and Advice Division. As a Special Assistant Attorney General, Dachille worked on a variety of public health initiatives, including an evaluation of the proposed conversion of CareFirst BlueCross/BlueShield with focus on whether the nonprofit health insurer was fulfilling its public obligations.

Dachille graduated from the University of Maryland School of Law in 1992, having served on the Executive Board of The Maryland Law Review and as a member of the National Moot Court Team.

# Daniel J. Friedman, PhD, is an independent consultant, with interests in population and

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community health information strategies; web strategies for communicating population health information; and uses of electronic health records for population health monitoring and research. Usually working with his colleague, Gib Parrish, and in conjunction with the Public Health Informatics Institute, Dan consults to national and state health agencies and national and state foundations.

Dr. Friedman formerly served as Assistant Commissioner of the Bureau of Health Statistics, Research, and Evaluation

of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health and as a member of the National Committee on Vital and Health Statistics, the health information policy advisory body to the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services.

He contributes to and serves as peer reviewer for professional journals and guest-edited special forums for the American Journal of Public Health and the Journal of Public Health Management and Practice. With Gib Parrish and Ed Hunter, Dr. Friedman co-edited and contributed to *Health Statistics in the 21*<sup>st</sup> *Century: Shaping Policy and Practice*, published by Oxford University Press.

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Donna Folkemer, MA, a Senior Policy Analyst at The Hilltop Institute, directs Hilltop's new

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Hospital Community Benefit Program. This program is the first ever central resource created specifically for state and local policymakers to improve the reporting and evaluation of tax-exempt hospitals' community benefit activities.

Before joining Hilltop, Ms. Folkemer was Group Director of the Forum for State Health Policy Leadership at the National Conference of State Legislatures. As such, she oversaw proposal development, research, and technical assistance activities of the group; conducted analysis for state legislators and staff on Medicaid, long-term care,



health information technology, and health care financing; prepared and presented testimony for state legislative committees; and managed responses to legislators. Prior to leading the group, Ms. Folkemer served as Program Director in the Forum and worked with state legislators and their staff on Medicaid, prescription drugs, and long-term care issues. She also developed proposals, managed research activities funded by public agencies and private foundations, wrote issue briefs and news articles, and provided testimony.

Prior to her commitment to the Forum, Ms. Folkemer was Director of Policy and Planning at the Medical Assistance Administration of the District of Columbia, where she oversaw policy analysis, regulation development, budgetary review, and planning for Medicaid. She also coordinated the implementation of the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) and managed a Medicaid eligibility expansion project. Prior to that, Ms. Folkemer was a Senior Research Associate for the Intergovernmental Health Policy Project at George Washington University. She was also Deputy Director of the Center for the Advancement of State Community Care Programs at the National Association of State Units on Aging. Prior to that, Ms. Folkemer served as Planner, Long-Term Care Division Chief, and then Planning and Evaluation Division Chief at the Maryland Office on Aging.

Ms. Folkemer earned her MA from Johns Hopkins University, her masters in community planning from the University of Maryland, and her BA from West Virginia University.

Freeman A. Hrabowski III, PhD, has served as President of UMBC (the University of Maryland,

His research and publications focus on science and math education, with special emphasis on minority participation and performance. He chaired the National Academies' committee that recently produced the report, "Expanding Underrepresented Minority Participation: America's Science and Technology Talent at the Crossroads."

In 2008, Dr. Hrabowski was named one of *America's Best Leaders* by *U.S. News & World Report*, which in both 2009

and 2010 ranked UMBC the #1 "Up and Coming" university in the nation and among the top colleges and universities in the nation for commitment to undergraduate teaching. In 2009, *TIME magazine* named him one of America's *10 Best College Presidents*.

Dr. Hrabowski serves as a consultant to the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the National Academies, and universities and school systems nationally. He also serves on the boards of the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, France-Merrick Foundation, Marguerite Casey Foundation (Chair), and The Urban Institute. He sits on the boards of Constellation Energy Group, McCormick & Company, and the Baltimore Equitable Society. He is a past member of the board of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Maryland Humanities Council (member and Chair).



Examples of recent honors include election to the American Academy of Arts & Sciences and the American Philosophical Society; receiving the prestigious TIAA-CREF Theodore M. Hesburgh Award for Leadership Excellence, the McGraw Prize in Education, the U.S. Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Mentoring, and the Columbia University Teachers College Medal for Distinguished Service; being named a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and Marylander of the Year by the editors of the Baltimore Sun; and being listed among Fast Company magazine's first Fast 50 Champions of Innovation in business and technology. He also holds honorary degrees from more than a dozen institutions, including Harvard, Princeton, Duke, Haverford College, the University of Michigan, Georgetown University, and Harvey Mudd College.

With philanthropist Robert Meyerhoff, Dr. Hrabowski co-founded the Meyerhoff Scholars Program in 1988. The program is open to all high-achieving students committed to pursuing advanced degrees and research careers in science and engineering, and advancing minorities in these fields. The program has become a national model, and based on program outcomes, Dr. Hrabowski has authored numerous articles and co-authored two books, *Beating the Odds* and *Overcoming the Odds* (Oxford University Press), focusing on parenting and high-achieving African American males and females in science. Both books are used by universities, school systems, and community groups around the country.

A child-leader in the Civil Rights Movement, Dr. Hrabowski was prominently featured in Spike Lee's 1997 documentary, *Four Little Girls*, on the racially motivated bombing in 1963 of Birmingham's Sixteenth Street Baptist Church.

Born in 1950 in Birmingham, Alabama, Dr. Hrabowski graduated at 19 from Hampton Institute with highest honors in mathematics. At the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, he received his MA (mathematics) and four years later his PhD (higher education administration/statistics) at age 24.

Her responsibilities include performing statistical analyses of large health care datasets for health economic, rate setting, and program assessment purposes; supporting the development and application of risk adjustment methods; developing protocols to link and integrate large health care datasets; and participating in the preparation and presentation of written reports and briefings.

Before joining The Hilltop Institute, Ms. Johnson was a Lead Health Analyst at Delmarva Foundation for Medical Care, Inc. While there, she analyzed Medicare Parts A and B claims data to identify cases of suspected fraud and/or abuse. She also worked in the home health setting, where she analyzed health care processes and outcomes data to quantify impact of improvement interventions at the national and state level. Prior to that, Ms. Johnson was a



Senior Functional Analyst with Lockheed Martin, where she designed, conducted, analyzed, and interpreted epidemiologic studies related to illness and injury in the active duty military population.

Ms. Johnson is author and co-author of many articles on such subjects as illness and injury prevention and quality improvement in home health. She has been published in *Military Medicine*, *American Journal of Nursing*, and *American Journal of Epidemiology*, among others. She has also delivered oral and poster presentations at several nationwide conferences, including the Academy Health and American Public Health Association annual research meetings and the Tri-Regional QIO conference.

Ms. Johnson earned an MS in mathematical sciences/statistics from Virginia Commonwealth University and a BA in mathematics from Cedarville University. She is currently pursuing a PhD in gerontology at UMBC.

# Michelle A. Larkin, JD, MS, RN, was promoted to assistant vice president, Health Group,

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effective April 2011. Prior to her promotion, Larkin was a team director and senior program officer with the Public Health team. Larkin led a major initiative to build the field of public health law through three integrated strategies: building the evidence for effective public health laws and policies; enhancing the public health infrastructure to support public health practitioners and their legal counsel; and increasing the support for, demand for, and use of law by policymakers, academics, and professionals in fields that impact health.

Larkin joined the Foundation in 1999 as program associate, where she focused on tobacco control policy efforts and end-of-life care.
